

# Western Landscape Symposium Pueblo Community College March 30th, 9 AM-3:30 PM

This is an educational forum to promote the creation of appealing and sustainable landscapes in southeastern Colorado, incorporating water wise garden practices and plants adapted to local climate and soil conditions. We're very excited to announce our Keynote Speaker, world renowned ecologist and conservationist Dr. Doug Tallamy, who will speak about how changing the way we landscape can stitch together fragmented habitats that support critical biodiversity.

Featured Native Plant Palmer's Penstemon, Penstemon palmeri This month's native is fragrant with large spikes of light pink flowers in early summer. Palmer's Penstemon is one of the 60 varieties of penstemon that can be found in Colorado. This is a heat-loving plant that needs well drained soils and can grow four to five feet tall. We recommend mulching with pea gravel instead of wood chips to allow for good air circulation. These beauties are great for attracting hummingbirds and bees - especially bumblebees. Seeds can be easily collected in mid-September when they become hard and dark in color. Gather the seeds by hand and share with friends and neighbors!



This spring is also a perfect time to pick up a rain barrel or two from our online sale! Time to save water and money by getting an easy to install barrel. Rain barrels collect runoff from your roof, allowing you to use natural rain water instead of treated water from the tap; your plants will thank you! Rain barrels also prevent water from running off your property and onto the street where it can pick up pollutants before entering local waterways.

As stewards of our watershed, we must adapt and respond to the ever-changing conditions that nature may throw our way. We work to restore the natural processes, enhance ecosystem services, and support a resilient and biodiverse watershed. As we navigate the twists and turns of springtime in our watershed, let us do so with a sense of wonder, gratitude, and reverence for the remarkable world in which we live.
