FCWD Awarded Two Grants

We are thrilled to announce two grants we've received to help fund 2024 efforts!


Conservation Service Corps Grant:

Supports partnership with the Mile High Youth Corps to provide maintenance and monitoring of four FCWD projects in Pueblo County. Funds for this project were awarded by Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO), which receives a portion of Colorado Lottery proceeds, to the Colorado Youth Corps Association for use by accredited conservation service corps. The goal of the program is to employ crews throughout the state on critical outdoor recreation and land conservation projects in partnership with local governments and open space agencies. FCWD will receive 3 weeks of work from Mile High Youth Corps - Southern Front Range valued at \$29,350. Youth and local volunteers will tackle mapping, non-native plant removal, willow staking, and other critical tasks in fragile riparian areas. Stay tuned for updates as we move forward throughout the year.


Colorado Association of Stormwater and Floodplain Managers (CAFSM) Grant:

To promote and install a residential rain garden in an underserved neighborhood in Colorado Springs. The District partnered with local permaculturalist Kelly Bull and secured \$2,500 for educational signage, materials, plants, and labor. A group of interested citizens has formed and will support the effort. We hope to announce work days and a tour in the coming months! What is a rain garden you ask? Check out our webpage.




2024, Here We Come! A note from Executive Director Alli Schuch
